THIS BLESSED WEEK

This Tuesday, November 1st, is the Feast of All Saints, a holy day of obligation. It is a special day for us because it reminds us of all those wonderful disciples of Jesus throughout the centuries who “made the grade.” When we think of saints, a whole litany of names come to mind — Saint Pascal, Francis of Assisi, Saint Theresa and of course, Our Blessed Mother, the Queen of All Saints. And while we honor those great and famous saints, All Saints Day invites us to give tribute to those many Servants of God whose names are not attached to any grand churches or great cathedrals, but who have taken their place in God’s Kingdom.

And who would they be? They are the people who committed themselves to Christ and lived out their faith by loving God and neighbor, as we were reminded in the Gospel last week. They may not have cured anyone or performed miracles. But they did the simple things that their vocation called them to in fidelity to God.

Ultimately, our hope is that we would be among those so honored on All Saints Day. We may not be remembered personally but we pray that our names will be inscribed in the Book of Life! See you at Mass on Tuesday.

Wednesday is All Soul’s Day. While this is not a holy day of obligation, I strongly recommend that you join us for Mass. This is the day when we pray for all those who have died and we pray that they may be joined now with God and all the saints. As Catholics, we realize that being good enough to go straight to heaven is for a rare few, yet we know it is not in God’s plan that anyone should be eternally damned to hell. This is where our teaching on purgatory comes in. Purgatory is a state of being prepared to see God face to face. Once this preparation is done, we believe the soul is then released into Paradise. How long is a person in purgatory? Who knows? It could be a long time or it might be only a blink of an eye. What is important is that we offer our prayers for those souls, especially the souls of those we have known personally. Join us for this special day of prayer.

CHANGE IS ON THE WAY!

As you know, the language in our liturgy will be changing with the coming of Advent. This is going to be a bit of a challenge. We’ve been learning the new Mass settings and we will soon be using new responses. I’m not a language scholar but I’ve been told these new words will be truer to the Latin original on which all the languages across the globe are based. The words of the priest will have dramatic changes. The style will be more formal. It will have the effect of slowing everyone down. We will have to think about the words we speak more carefully. These are good things. Let’s give it our best for God!

To help us prepare, Father Bill De Salvo of the Joliet Diocese will give a presentation called “The Mass Changes Us” at Saint Pascal on Monday, November 7 at 7 PM in the church. Please plan to come to this helpful and informative talk. Father De Salvo is pastor at Saint Isaac Jogues Church in Hinsdale and has been involved in liturgy for many years.

The Mass Changes Us!

Preparing to welcome the new translation of The Roman Missal – The Mass

**Monday ~ 7pm in church
November 7th**

Father De Salvo, a priest of the Diocese of Joliet, pastor of Saint Isaac Jogues Church in Hinsdale, and Dean of the Eastern DuPage Deanery of the Diocese of Joliet, will present a three-part series on the Mass, in preparation for the upcoming changes we will see in the translation of the Roman Missal. Father's presentations will focus on the history of the Mass, the "why" we do certain things at Mass in a certain way, the reasons behind the "new translation" and what exactly those changes will look like for us.

Pope Benedict XVI has approved a new translation of the Mass for use in English speaking countries. The United

States will begin using the new translation on the First Sunday of Advent, November 27th, 2011.

The Mass is not "changing." What is changing is the English translation of the Mass – from the original Latin.

When the new English translation of the Mass is introduced in the United States, the style of worship will be more formal. But it will also be deeper theologically and more evocative emotionally and intellectually. The Vatican's intention was not so much to make the liturgy more formal as to make the English version conform more closely to the original Latin.

The implementation of the new English translation of the Roman Missal provides an occasion for all Catholics to reflect once again on the meaning and central significance of the Mass. It is a time to renew our own understanding and appreciation of the Eucharistic Liturgy.

Join us for these informative presentations, especially if you're curious or confused about the upcoming changes to the Mass, and/or you want to learn more about the Mass – why we do things, and the rich 2000 year tradition behind this central act of worship of the Roman Catholic Church.

Catholic Organizations Respond to HHS "Preventive Services" Mandate

We, the undersigned, strongly support access to life-affirming health care for all, and the ability of secular and religious groups and individuals to provide and receive such care. That is why we have raised objections to a rule issued by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services forcing almost all private health plans to cover sterilization procedures and contraceptive drugs, including drugs that may cause an early abortion.

As written, the rule will force Catholic organizations that play a vital role in providing health care and other needed services either to violate their conscience or severely curtail those services. This would harm both religious freedom and access to health care.

The HHS mandate puts many faith-based organizations and individuals in an untenable position. But it also harms society as a whole by undermining a long American tradition of respect for religious liberty and freedom of conscience. In a pluralistic society, our health care system should respect the religious and ethical convictions of all. We ask Congress, the Administration, and our fellow Americans to acknowledge this truth and work with us to reform the law accordingly.

Postures and Gestures at Mass

In the celebration of Mass we raise our hearts, minds and voices to God, but we are creatures composed of body as well as spirit and so our prayer is not confined to our minds, hearts and voices, but is expressed by our bodies as well. When our bodies participate in our prayer we pray with our

whole person, as the embodied spirits God created us to be, and this engagement of our entire being in prayer helps us to pray with greater attention

During Mass we assume different postures: standing, kneeling, sitting, and we are also invited to make a variety of gestures. These postures and gestures are not merely ceremonial. They have profound meaning and, when done with understanding, can enhance our personal participation in Mass. In fact, these actions are the way in which we engage our bodies in the prayer that is the Mass.

Each posture we assume at Mass underlines and reinforces the meaning of the action in which we are taking part at that moment in our worship. Standing is a sign of respect and honor, so we stand as the celebrant who represents Christ enters and leaves the assembly. This posture, from the earliest days of the Church, has been understood as the stance of those who are *risen with Christ and seek the things that are above*. When we stand for prayer we assume our full stature before God, not in pride, but in humble gratitude for the marvelous thing God has done in creating and redeeming each one of us. By Baptism we have been given a share in the life of God, and the posture of standing is an acknowledgment of this wonderful gift. We stand for the Gospel, the pinnacle of revelation, the words and deeds of the Lord, and the bishops of the United States have chosen standing as the posture to be observed in this country for the reception of Communion, the sacrament which unites us in the most profound way possible with Christ who, now gloriously risen from the dead, is the cause of our salvation.

The posture of kneeling signified penance in the early Church: the awareness of sin casts us to the ground! So thoroughly was kneeling identified with penance that the early Christians were forbidden to kneel on Sundays and during the Easter Season when the prevailing spirit of the liturgy was that of joy and thanksgiving. In the Middle Ages kneeling came to signify the homage of a vassal to his lord, and more recently this posture has come to signify adoration. It is for this reason that the bishops of this country have chosen the posture of kneeling for the entire Eucharistic Prayer.

Sitting is the posture of listening and meditation, so the congregation sits for the pre-Gospel readings and may also sit for the period of meditation following Communion.

Gestures too involve our bodies in prayer. The most familiar of these is the Sign of the Cross with which we begin Mass and with which, in the form of a blessing, the Mass concludes. Because it was by his death on the cross that Christ redeemed humankind, we trace the sign of the cross on our foreheads, lips and hearts at the beginning of the Gospel. Fr. Romano Guardini, a scholar and professor of liturgy wrote of this gesture:

When we cross ourselves, let it be with a real sign of the cross. Instead of a small, cramped gesture that gives no notion of its meaning, let us make a large, unhurried sign, from forehead to breast, from shoulder to shoulder, consciously feeling how it includes the whole of us, our thoughts, our attitudes, our body and soul, every part of us all at once, how it consecrates and sanctifies us ... (Romano Guardini, **Sacred Signs**, 1927)

But there are other gestures that intensify our prayer at Mass. During the Confiteor the action of striking our breasts at the words *through my own fault* can strengthen my awareness that *my sin is my fault*. In the Creed we are invited to bow at the words which commemorate the Incarnation: *by the power of the Holy Spirit he was born of the Virgin Mary and became man*. This gesture signifies our profound respect and gratitude to Christ who, though God, did not hesitate to come among us as a human being, sharing our human condition in order to save us from sin and restore us to friendship with God. This gratitude is expressed with even greater solemnity on the Feast of the Annunciation of the Lord and on Christmas when we genuflect at these words.

The *Our Father* is followed by the Exchange of Peace, the gesture which we express through a prayerful greeting of peace, that we are at peace, not enmity, with others. This exchange is symbolic. The persons near me with whom I share the peace signify for me, as I do for them, the broader community of the Church and all humankind.

Finally, with the new *General Instruction*, we are asked to make a sign of reverence, to be determined by the bishops of each country or region, before receiving Communion standing. The bishops of this country have determined that the sign which we will give before Communion is to be a bow, a gesture through which we express our reverence and give honor to Christ who comes to us as our spiritual food.

In addition to serving as a vehicle for the prayer of beings composed of body and spirit, the postures and gestures in which we engage at Mass have another very important function. The Church sees in these common postures and gestures both a symbol of the unity of those who have come together to worship and a means of fostering that unity. We are not free to change these postures to suit our own individual piety, for the Church makes it clear that our unity of posture and gesture is an expression of our participation in the one Body formed by the baptized with Christ, our head. When we stand, kneel, sit, bow and sign ourselves in common action, we given unambiguous witness that we are indeed the Body of Christ, united in heart, mind and spirit.

When we talk about domestic violence, who and what are we discussing?

"I am an abuser. I am male, female, educated or not, wealthy, poor, or in the middle. I represent every ethnic and racial group. I may or may not have been abused as a child or adult myself. I do not necessarily dabble in alcohol or other drugs, but I may. I am a Christian, Muslim, a Jew...from any and all religious backgrounds. I don't like myself very much, but I don't seem to be able to stop what I am doing. I may be more abusive when I am angry, and I seem to react strongly when I think a situation is getting out of my control. Sometimes my violence is physical, but not always. I also abuse people verbally, psychologically, and sexually. Sometimes I am so subtle, people don't even know it's happened until much later when they feel bad."

MYTH: Most of the time, domestic violence is not really that serious.

FACT: Domestic violence is a crime, an illegal act with serious consequences. Although there are aspects of domestic violence (e.g. emotional, psychological, spiritual, financial abuse) that may not be considered legally criminal, the U.S. Bishops have stated that no one should stay in a violent relationship.

Week Five Focus: The Mystery of Creation

We have often heard the Old Testament account of the story of creation. "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth" (Genesis 1:1). **The New Testament reveals that God created everything by the eternal Word, His beloved Son. The Church's faith likewise confesses the creative action of the Holy Spirit, the "giver of life", "the Creator Spirit" ...** (cf. the Nicene Creed) (291). **Creation is the common work of the Holy Trinity (292).** (Catechism of the Catholic Church Paragraphs 291 – 292, i.e. CCC).

God did not create the world as a finished product with complete perfection, but rather he created the universe "in a state of journeying" (*in statu viae*) toward an ultimate perfection yet to be attained ... (302). God created us to be intelligent and free ... in order to complete the work of creation ... (306-307). God freely loves us and asks us to realize we can do nothing without him. We are not God, but we are like God in that we are in relationship with him and thus carry out his providential plan for all creation.

God created us out of love and because of that great love gave us the gift of freedom. Yet, he permits evil because he respects the freedom of creation. Love requires freedom. No one can love and not give the beloved freedom. Because we have been given a free will, we as human being, can cause evil. Yet, in the midst of evil, God is so powerful as to bring good out of evil. That does not mean evil is good but rather "... that in everything God works for good for those who love him" (Romans 8:28) (313). **Man must therefore respect the particular goodness of every creature, to avoid any disordered use of things which would be in contempt of the Creator and would bring disastrous consequences for human beings and their environment (339).**

Becoming more familiar with what we believe as Catholics can help us to better relate to the action of God's work in our daily lives. You can find more about The Profession of Faith and in the Catechism of the Catholic Church by reading paragraphs 279-421.
